The Child Guidance class is an upper level course in the Human Services cluster of the Career and Technical Education Department (CTE.)




MATH TO CELEBRATE THE BIG 100TH


SATURDAY CAMP IN MRS. P. VILLARREAL'S SCIENCE CLASS

During this visit, students were shown how to correctly use binoculars to identify various birds and butterflies. The experiences the National Park Service gifted to the fourth grade students is one that sparked interest and will stay with them for years to come.



SCIENCE FAIR PARENT TRAINING

The Science Fair Parent Training held at Buena Vista Elementary was a huge success. The speaker, Mrs. Ana Leyva/Parent Community Coordinator for Federal Programs gave a wonderful presentation to over 50 parents in attendance. Mrs. Leyva went on to explain to the parents the scientific method. She explained that it is the process all scientists use to investigate science questions. It involves identifying a problem, learning what is already known about that problem, thinking of a solution or answer (called a hypothesis), doing an experiment to test your hypothesis, and reaching a conclusion based on what you learned. Mrs. Leyva empowered the parents with all the information needed to know to conduct a proper science fair experiment/ research. Parents were engaged by asking questions. A trifold was given to all parents that showed up to the training.



BUENA VISTA SCIENCE FAIR

Each year, Buena Vista students come together to share personal interests in science and technology in preparation for the campus science fair. Students applied their knowledge of science and technology to the world around them and conducting research in the form of a science fair project. Students worked hard, they received support in designing and conducting research for their projects from their teachers and families. They increased in knowledge, improved their organizational skills, enhanced their thinking skills, and had fun along the way. Over 200 Buena Vista students presented their projects at the school's campus science fair on January 2015. All qualifying projects, 1st and 2nd place advanced to the SFDRCISD District Science Fair.
