Because of their dedication, not only will students have quality textbooks (text, photos, diagrams, vocabulary words and guiding questions, videos, links to online resources, interactive flashcards and real-world simulations that explain concepts) at their fingertips, the District will also be able to reallocate monies which would have otherwise been handed over to textbook companies for other teacher and student needs.

The following Social Studies and Math teams led this year's digital textbook project: At SFMMS, Mr. Joe Mancha led the charge in creating the 6th grade Social Studies book while Emily Vasquez and Luis Esparza collaborated to produce the 8th Grade Social Studies book. The DRMS Algebra I textbook was created thanks to the efforts of Mrs. Maria Sigley and Mrs. Gloria Castaneda; the Freshman Algebra I textbook was the labor of Alejandra Rios, Sarah Flores and Jec Castañeda; and Melinda Costilla did a wonderful job in producing the Geometry textbook. Finally, the high school saw some valuable representation, and now has a digital U.S. History textbook thanks to the efforts of Mr. Rick Torres. I look forward to seeing the use of these textbooks and the continued efforts of our teachers to produce other textbooks.
