The librarian, Mrs. Ballard, took time to introduce the library and its many resources to the students. The band director, Mr. Basler, was taking extra time to ensure students understood tempo. Lastly, Mrs. Vallejo, English teacher, took time to ensure her students maximized their learning by continuing to emphasize the mastery of classroom procedures. I am certain that the time spent teaching procedures will yield high student learning throughout the year – Excellent job!
