I asked our Curriculum and Instruction Department to highlight some planning protocol sessions that embody the reform we are working to achieve. Here is what one report indicated:

This week, I was amazed to see the 4th and 5th grade math teachers at Garfield Elementary make a connection to the assessment for the 1st six weeks (Planning Protocol, Step 1). In the process of planning, they discussed the word "formula" is used often in their direct instruction, but the assessment reminded them of other ways this word could be used, such as "expression". The teachers indicated their kids may not be familiar with this word. They then added it to their Academic Vocabulary list and created a journal entry that would utilize "expression" in place of "formula" (Planning Protocol, Steps 3 & 4). The teachers then proceeded to create their engaging lesson on Volume. These conversations that take place while planning, are what creates powerful lessons and rigorous learning opportunities.

In so many professions, such as technology, engineering and medicine, there are mathematically proven methods to solve problems and enhance outcomes. In our profession, the only assured guideline for success is "collaboration". I am encouraged by what I have seen thus far and am hopeful for the continued implementation of our reform movement. I encourage every teacher and administrator to be a model for this type of collaboration.
