Wednesday we gathered once more with the Citizen's Committee to finalize the \$25,000,000 construction recommendations that will be presented to the school board in January. At the top of the committee's list is renovating the 8th grade campus on Griner Street into a Performing Arts Center. The **well-attended** student **performances** and **activities** from this past week continue to indicate that our community is in need of a large capacity performing arts

center. The day closed on Wednesday with our middle school and high school **Color Guard** teams **performing** at the High School gym. The students presented multiple routines, many of which they choreographed themselves. The hard work and commitment was evident in each performance. On Thursday, I, along with various community members, were invited by Miss Guanajuato, CTE High School Teacher, to judge her students' **Corporate Expo**. Although it was taxing to the stomach to sample every product, we managed and enjoyed each treat. To close the day on Thursday, my family and I visited the Paul Poag Theater where so many students participated in the Elementary All City **Choir Concert**. I want to **commend** every music teacher from each elementary school. Because of their hard work and dedication, the students were well **prepared**. I reluctantly left the choir concert a bit early to get to the High School and enjoy the last few selections at the **Christmas Band Concert**. I continue to be impressed with the skills of our students. It is impressive to see so much talent and quite humbling to know that it begins within our community and through the dedication of all those involved in the education system.

I had the opportunity on Friday to stop by the **Freshman campus** to observe some social studies classes and visit with the Principal, Mr. Limon. I was pleased that even on a Friday afternoon, students were engaged in learning and teachers were continuing with planning instruction for the coming week. Great job!
