While at the conference I also had the opportunity to congratulate the Superintendent of Laredo ISD, <u>Dr. A.</u> <u>Marcus Nelson</u>, as he was named the Superintendent of the Year for the State of Texas. I can't think of anyone more deserving of this honor and I am proud he has been a friend and mentor to me. Awesome job!

Before leaving to Dallas, we had an extremely valuable and often times exciting 3 days. On Tuesday and Wednesday I visited with small groups of teachers at <u>Calderon</u> Elementary and Buena Vista Elementary. Each of the groups was represented by hard working teachers who were willing to share some of their concerns. We want our teachers to know that their expressed concerns help shape our course of action and most importantly our allocation of resources. It was made clear that we need to hire more technicians to keep up with our growing needs and to address the outdated technology equipment at our elementary schools. I guarantee you we will have a plan of action within a very short time.

Although I did not get to attend our Friday night activities at Walter Leverman Stadium, I did have an opportunity to participate with DRMS students on Tuesday and Wednesday. Tuesday I enjoyed watching our DRMS volleyball girls in action and Wednesday I attended a football game. I must admit that when I walked onto DRMS on Wednesday I got the feeling of being at a carnival. Besides being very well attended, the Pom Team set up an elaborate, and highly enjoyable concession stand. Not only did they wow the crowd with their phenomenal dancing skills, they also served up a darn good burger and funnel cake for desert. Congratulations to Mrs. Kayla Lopez and her parent supporters.

Another highlight of last week was the opportunity to join <u>Calderon Elementary students</u> and our high school students <u>(class of 2016)</u> as they listened to a comedian and motivational speaker, <u>David Garcia</u>. Mr. Garcia graciously included Del Rio in his <u>Live the Dream</u> tour which encompassed the entire Texas – Mexico border.
