I have always told students and teachers that we are in the business of teaching and learning. Our goal is to engage our students in the type of learning that will allow them to compete and win once they leave our hallways and classrooms. As serious as this task is, I also remind teachers and students that we should have fun accomplishing our task. Throughout this past week, I had the opportunity to see students engaged in rigorous learning and having fun! Our school district is on the right track and I am proud to be the Superintendent.

The evenings of this past week were filled with incredible fine arts performances. The district's middle school and high school mariachi groups performed at the Paul Poag Theater on Monday. Tuesday evening brought A Night of Jazz, followed by a Choir Concert on Wednesday, a mega band concert on Thursday, and finally a Band Banquet on Friday. Although individual students were impressive in their own right, what was most remarkable was the number of students participating in our extracurricular activities and the passion that ensued in their performances. It's important to make note that the amount of parent support available to the students surpasses our expectations.
