It was reassuring to see her students engaged deeply and enhancing their learning. On Wednesday, I was able to sit in on a **planning session** and visit some classrooms at Calderon Elementary. Ms. Muraira, principal, and Mrs. Mericer, Instructional Coach, were doing something absolutely awesome. They were taking new teachers on **Learning Walks** to observe exceptional instruction throughout the campus. To close the loop on the learning opportunity, they then discussed the finer points that were observed. Learning Walks truly are a worthwhile investment in the success of new teachers.

Later that evening I visited the <u>Polar Express Literacy Night</u> at Cardwell Elementary. It was nice to see so many <u>students</u> and their parents engaged in learning various methods of developing literacy skills at home. From cutting and pasting to building vocabulary models with <u>edible treats</u>, everyone learned something new. Aside from the literacy experience, students had the opportunity to visit with <u>Santa Claus</u> and <u>perform</u> for their parents. I ended the evening by joining my family at a <u>Band Booster</u> fundraiser at Mr. Gatti's. It is always nice to see <u>teachers</u> coming out to support their students.

Friday morning I headed to Lamar Elementary for a couple of activities. However, on my way to Lamar, I saw the Band Booster President, Mr. Eddie Solis, demonstrating, on a cold day at the carwash, that there really isn't any limits to <u>volunteer work</u>. I am certain that we have a tremendous band program because of the tremendous commitment from our parents. Upon arrival at Lamar Elementary, I was able to observe their awards ceremony. Parents, grandparents, and other <u>family members</u> took pride in seeing the <u>principal</u> handout different types of awards. After the awards assembly, I was encouraged to visit <u>Mrs. Peña's classroom</u> where <u>Toby Globy</u> and Mr. Onofre, from the City of Del Rio, were talking to students about necessary precautions when using natural gas. The next stop was Cardwell Elementary for a surprise assembly. At the surprise assembly, representatives from <u>HEB</u> presented a check for \$1,000.00 to Mrs. Guanajuato-Webb, campus principal.
