Lots of teaching and learning coupled with numerous students' activities makes for exciting but taxing days for our staff. In consideration of this we will work and live as lifelong learners alongside our students. I believe that together we can best determine how we can improve the use of our staff development days and daily planning sessions. Thank you for all that you have done and will continue to do!

Next, I want to highlight one of our student's heroes. This week, the focus is on <u>Ms. Rocio Peña</u>, a fourth grade teacher at Garfield Elementary. The success of <u>Ms. Peña's students</u>, in part, can be attributed to her excellent use of anchor charts and use of journaling. The emphasis she places on <u>vocabulary development</u> and her use of guiding questions is a model to be followed. Although she is an excellent teacher with lots of instructional skills, I was most impressed with how much she enjoyed teaching her students. Congratulations on a job well done!
